A Tribute to Jack Kimbrough

It is the way of things that we must say farewell to absent friends. When I joined the



Alvin RC Club in 2002, Jack Kimbrough was the president. He had been in this role for several years. My first impression was that he was rather gruff and opinionated, but as I grew to know him what I saw was a man who truly loved this club and took a very personal interest in its success. As a president, he was decisive in action, and he did not shy away from controversy. These are necessary traits for any leader.

Jack was a builder of aircraft. By that I do not mean that he assembled ARFs. He built from kits, and designed his own aircraft from scratch. There are not many like him left in this hobby. He liked delta-wing crates and built several – most of them flew well.

Jack was a veteran of the Korean War. His passing on or about Memorial Day is in a way appropriate. He had the values of what has been referred to as the greatest American generation. I salute him and his generation for what they fought for and died for. We owe to them so much that so many now take for granted.

Some might say he was resistant to change. I'm here to tell you he embraced electric flight without hesitation and in later years became a proponent for it. He burned up a few ESCs, one LiPo battery pack (in a crash), and struggled (like many of us) with the modern transmitters and their confusing programming menus. In his lifetime he lived through the accelerating technological changes of our hobby. Do you remember tube transmitters and escapement controls? For a man in his late 70s and early 80s, he was quite open to new ideas.

Jack was a man of faith, the faith of our fathers. I know this because (as some will say I have a tendency to do) we talked quite a bit about religious issues. God bless him. Jack was close to his family. I witnessed the love he had for his son, Keith, and the love his son had for his father. May God strengthen his family in the time of their loss.

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It is difficult to imagine an Alvin RC Model Aircraft Association without Jack Kimbrough, but we must go on. He said to me awhile back, "Coming out to the field is the highlight of my day." He meant it. In his last days here on earth he could be found in the clubhouse. He complained about not being able to sleep properly and would drift off to sleep while sitting in his chair. We worried about his driving. Until the last week of his life he could be found at the field.

Here's to Jack Kimbrough. Rest in peace. I expect to see you again! Do they have balsa wood in heaven?

"Bucket List" (Joe Nall) Report:

In mid-May Bill Bley, Larry Goodwin and I spent the better part of three days at the Joe Nall which is held each year in Woodruff, South Carolina at the Triple Tree Aerodrome. While there we found a couple of our members, Marty Robinson and Jason Cullum who were spending the full week. The Joe Nall has been held annually since 1983 and grows bigger and better each year. This year stats: 1,484 registered pilots (578 Classic,

314 3D, 355 Electric, 81 Float, 63 Helicopter and 21 Control Line). 45 states and 10 foreign countries were represented.

This is 400+ acres of model aircraft of every type imaginable, 5 flight lines with food vendors near most flight lines, camping facilities and wall to wall RC vendors (94 actually). If you need something for your current or future airplane it should be there!!!!





The area is great and the entire experience is family and Model Airplane oriented. Southwest flies nonstop to Greenville/Spartanburg and Woodruff is an easy 20 mile drive from the airport area. Hotels near the airport are reasonably priced or there is plenty of camping areas available at the event with quality showers and restroom facilities. Attendance is limited to AMA members with their families and guests which means essentially everyone at the event is truly into or interested in model aviation.





After being there my current plans are to return next year and bring an airplane. What we found is there is plenty of opportunities to fly and it really doesn't matter that you might not be flying the biggest or best – just go and have fun. It is back in my Bucket List.

Projects

Steve Leslie submitted the following. What a great way to setup for spray painting a fuselage or anything that needs to be rotated....Thanks Steve

Rotating Fuselage Holder

Spray painting isn't my greatest skill; I find that painting anything that isn't flat and laying horizontal results in runs, uneven coats and generally poor results. The vertical (curved) surfaces of fuselages are particularly prone to this issue, in addition, as the fuselage has to sit on something while it's being painted I find I can't paint the whole thing at one time and have to wait on paint drying then rotate to a different position before painting the rest of the item.

I had a brain wave a couple of years ago that if I could suspend the fuselage between two points and be able to rotate it, I could paint the whole thing, and, rotate it while it dried to eliminate runs (well most of them).

I saw a battery operated Rotisserie kit on line (@ \$30 on Amazon and other sites) made for the "Son of Hibachi" grills which I purchased then modified to hold and rotate a fuselage. The first picture shows the contraption as you get it, the orange piece is the battery housing and small gearbox which is the end I use on the firewall with a round plywood plate screwed on, the other end is a handle with a wood screw brazed onto the square shaft that is screwed into the rudder post of the fuselage (may modify that to be a "Tee" bracket that can have two screws to make it stronger).

The two black flat steel pieces (which would be what you clamp to your BBQ to hold the rotating assembly) were then clamped to a car axle stand on one end and on the other end just bent then screwed to a wooden box I had which the driven and non-driven ends of my rotator then slot into.

The fuselage can then be painted, rotated slowly, stopped at a given position etc. as you paint or wait for paint to dry.

First plane I painted with this device was my Great Planes Ultra Sport 60, next one was my Giant Yellow Aircraft P-40 (sadly no longer with us). Most recent use of the device was painting my Mid West AT-6 which is glassed over sheeted balsa and painted with Warbird Colors Orange Yellow paint. It is 84" span 1/6 scale and has the NGH 38cc Four stroke Gas engine for power, should fly in a few weeks (I hope).
